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FR. ADTODIO BAROL'S MESSAGE FOR SUDDAY - MARCH 19TH, 2023

Dear sisters/brothers, parishioners of St. Thomas More and St. Bernadette,

As we continue our Lenten journey of prayers and sacrifice, let us use the words of Psalm 53, to remind us of our faith and trust in the Lord of mercy and compassion, "O God, save me by your name, by your power, defend my cause. O God, hear my prayer; give ear to the words of my mouth." Last weekend we reviewed our own life's journey and found out that it is like the journey of the chosen people of Israel, that we have a God who have been so good and merciful to us and has provided us of all our needs. We just have to trust that he will not leave us helpless, but we just have to call on him and trust his love and compassion. Let us try to avoid the chosen people's attitude of grumbling against God if something unpleasant comes our way, because we know that life has its ups and downs, joys and sorrows, lights and darkness, sufferings and wellness, and if we know how to endure, victory is ours to behold. Our Easter Sunday will always be preceded with a Good Friday.

In this weekend's reading, let us try to focus on the word, "Believe". This is what the man born blind said when Jesus asked him, he said, "Lord, I believe." From the start of their encounter, he had already shown his trust in Jesus, that he allowed Jesus to put mud with his saliva and spread the mud on his eyes, and followed what Jesus commanded him to do, "Go wash in the pool of Siloam." We learn that he trusted Jesus' words and then he was able to see. Now we can go back to the second Sunday of Lent when God the Father, said, "This is my Son the beloved, in whom I am well pleased, listen to him" The blind man listened to Jesus and great things happened when we know how to listen.

This fourth weekend we are challenged to listen, to trust and to believe in the words of Jesus. Let us imitate Jesus, who spent time to pray, he listened and did the will of God and so he was willing to go to Jerusalem to fulfill his passion of suffering, dying, and rising again to save the world. In this midway in Lent we are asked to reflect on how faithful we have been to our Lenten plan, to pray, fast and do works of mercy in imitation of our Lord Jesus.

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The Stations of the Cross devotion is offering us words of reflections on Jesus' final journey of life to show his acrifice to die on the cross for us his followers. The prayers and reflections in each station are lessons for us to learn during our life's journey here on earth, and worth repeating every year since our path to eternal life can easily be clouded with things of this world. Like the man born blind, we sometimes would just be comfortable sitting along the road and not making effort to join those in journey to holiness towards Christ the light of the world. This Sunday let us try to imitate the blind man's spirit of listening to Jesus, trusting in his words, and believing in his love and mercy that any darkness we experience in life, with Christ's light we can find our way to the kingdom of love, justice and peace. In solidarity with our sisters and brothers in the global south, let us journey with them in their struggle to fight against those who are trying to drive them out of their ancestral land because multinational companies want to turn their land into mining, and agri-business and national parks in the name of progress and development, but in reality it is for the benefit of the few wealthy people sacrificing the environment and Mother Earth our common home.
